

Army Infantryman Pursues Teaching Career

Veteran turns to VFW Help A Hero program after starting to worrying about how to pay for his last few semesters of undergrad

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Stephen Gerard, of Sherwood, Ore., looks forward to pursuing his passion for science and education after graduating from Portland State University. He was recently awarded the VFW's "Sport Clips Help A Hero Scholarship," and will soon graduate with his bachelor's in general science and geology.

Gerard plans to apply for his Master's in Education, while also earning an endorsement in Integrated Science Teaching.

"The thought of being actively involved in science education really excites me," he said. "It's this excitement that makes me believe I made the right choice. Also, I'm equally thrilled to have a career that will allow me to see my children as much as possible. That's really the most important thing."
